REGULAR MEETING MINUTES APRIL 18, 2023

Departmental Reports: Mayor Sellers stated that if Council has any questions to please reach out to the individual Director. He stated that if they have additional questions, they can contact the Office of the Mayor as well for further discussion.

Residents' Requests and Comments:

Francine Wahome, Ward 2 stated she is a retired Educator and Intervention Specialist and wanted to ask Police Chief Haynes a question. She asked what is happening in the world because students spoke to her about how the man that shot the 16 year old was supposed to be kept for 24 hours. They kept him for two hours and didn't get him for about four or five days. She asked what is happening in the world for black and brown people. She stated they try to educate students and give them direction but things turn around. She shared she participated in A Walk with Dr. King; her aunt was on the Edmund Pettus Bridge; and her husband came here from Africa and they traveled the world. Ms. Wahome stated she couldn't go to Australia unless she was with him because Black Americans couldn't go, even with Australian aborigines. Leslie Uggams was there because she was able to go with her husband! She stated the world is getting worse with our color and asked how she explains to students how to take care of themselves and watch out for things. She questioned what is wrong with NRA and CPAC because there is nothing wrong with getting background checks.

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Police Chief Haynes responded that he cannot answer for everything that's going on in the world, but he can for matters happening in Warrensville.

Ms. Wahome stated when families first moved to Warrensville, it was mainly Caucasians and a few blacks. Now, the population has grown full of minorities, yet a white business can come in and use our resources to prop up their money tree.

Mayor Sellers thanked Ms. Wahome and stated there is a three minute time limit.

Angela Anderson, Ward 5 stated she is speaking for the residents on Donover Rd. which used to be a quiet street. She reported for almost two years, their neighborhood has become unsafe and they feel unprotected. She stated there is a drug house at 24570 Donover Rd. and people walk in between and behind their properties to get to the drug house on the Merrygold Blvd. and the Longleaf Rd. sides. She reported people use the... *<inaudible>* to climb through the windows of the drug house. People have been seen urinating and performing sexual acts outside of the property. She reported the front window of the property has been shot out and a brick thrown through the window. There has been a gun and holster found in the street on Donover Rd. Ms. Anderson shared people have mistaken her property for the drug house by ringing her doorbell and banging on the door between 12-5a.m. She reported an individual smashed her window mistaking her house for the drug house and she has to pay for it. She reported the police told her since he wasn't seen breaking the window, he could not be arrested. She shared her mother had just left her driveway minutes before an accident took place in the drug house driveway and a car went across the grass and children were outside. She stated the police have escalated their presence in the neighborhood with drive-bys but they miss a lot of activity by just driving by. Ms. Anderson stated when residents call the police, they don't show up right away so often they miss what they've been called for. She reported there is a UHaul truck constantly being used at the property along with multiple other cars back and forth. She stated residents want their street back! She stated if this residence was next door to them or their loved ones, they would not like it. She asked how much more the city expects them to endure as she is considering moving. She asked what can be done before someone gets hurt. She asked what is the timeline or their mode of action to rectify the situation. She stated she has spoken to Chief Haynes but they want more done.

Chief Haynes stated this matter was addressed at the last Council Meeting. He stated the police presence on that street has continued and they are not going to lay off. He reported he has spoken to Ms. Anderson on numerous occasions regarding the property and they are watching the property. Any vehicle leaving the property is subject to a traffic stop. They even did a traffic stop on the father of the individual that is residing there. He reported the UHaul truck was stopped and they towed one of the vehicles that was parked there last night because there were parking citations on it. Chief Haynes stated they are going to continue monitoring the situation until they have enough to go after the individual; they are not going to lay off of it. He understands everyone's frustrations but they are going to take care of it. He stated he cannot give them a time frame and won't do it.

Building Commissioner Brown stated after the last Council Meeting, he did a site visit on April 5, 2023 at 11:00a.m. and walked the property. He reported the property wasn't in bad shape

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overall but he did speak to the owner about the window. The owner reported there is a claim with State Farm who were at the property last Wednesday to finalize the claim. He shared they will be releasing the claim to the owner so the window will be replaced. He stated that should have in the next week or two.

Shemaiah Williams, Ward 5 stated he lives on Donover Rd. and this is the third time the window is being replaced. He reported that it has been shot out and had a brick thrown through it twice. He stated he saw Building Commissioner Brown at the property.

Mayor Sellers stated they understand there is a serious issue over there. There isn't anything that precludes it from being broken out multiple time but he assured Mr. Williams that Building Commissioner Brown is on it and that there are several things working. He stated he understands how uncomfortable it is but this is not TV: it's not going to work itself out in 20 minutes. The Police Department are working through the challenge that has to be worked to exercise the restraint that needs to happen at the property. They have to let it play itself out. **Mr. Williams** stated the police are always around but do they ever stop sometime and not just ride by.

Mayor Sellers responded there has to be probable cause to do things and then they react within that timeframe. They don't make up the rules as they go along.

Mr. Williams stated that he is sorry to hear that Ms. Anderson is thinking about moving.

Mayor Sellers stated he doesn't think anyone wants that to occur and he emphasizes because he can only image because the situation needs to be resolved. Trust and believe it will.

Anneicia Hall, Ward 5 stated that last Saturday is when they pulled the Fiat out onto the street because they had a limousine with a driver pull in to pick up his drugs. She is tired of it because the driveway is right by her and she's sick of it! She said they see the boy walking up the street and doesn't know if it's because of his skin color or whatever is going on. Because he's white? He can get away with it? No, she doesn't believe that!

Mayor Sellers replied he does not think that's the case. They prosecute enough black and white in this city.

Ms. Hall disagreed and said it's a white thing.

Chief Haynes reported that the Fiat vehicle was pulled out on the street Saturday and they issued an overnight parker and Sunday it was still on the street. They issued another parking citation and yesterday the vehicle was on the street so they issued a third citation. He shared the city's ordinance states that if they give two or more citations, they can tow so that's what they did.

Janice Rox, Ward 5 stated she is present representing the Planning Commission and hoped that Council will back their decision to deny Ms. Henderson's application for the bar on Harvard Ave. She stated they denied it because the President of the Homeowner's Association came before them on behalf of the organization and they do not want the bar in that area. She reported that the

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councilperson for that area does not want the bar there either. She reiterated that she hoped Council will take Planning Commission's denial in to consideration.

Calvin Jones, Ward 2 stated he was there for the opposite of what Ms. Rox was saying about Ms. Henderson's application. He stated he knows the Hendersons from Warrensville and their grandparents are from Warrensville. He stated he understood the problem that was considered and Planning Commission did a good job of ...*<audible>*. He stated the Hendersons said Planning Commission spoke to the homeowners but no one spoke to him about how he felt. He stated the Hendersons don't just want a bar but a bar *and* a restaurant and they own other businesses. He stated Mr. Henderson is a young man from Warrensville that is trying to come up and have his own career. Mr. Jones stated the last place was a bad taste in his mouth and he knows it was in the city's. He stated he doesn't think that no one should be allowed to open a bar there. He commented that Warrensville could use any business that is making money. He stated Warrensville shouldn't have a problem with someone that is following the rules and regulations, has the right background and can maintain a business under the guidelines of Council and Warrensville itself. He stated it does not matter what kind of business it is because Warrensville needs a business that is generating taxes for the community. He stated if this young man and his wife have everything that needs to be presented to Council in order, why shouldn't they be given an opportunity. He stated everyone knows that if the applicants open a bar and restaurant here and do not follow the guidelines, it won't take the city long to shut them down like the bar before.

Mayor Sellers replied that the matter is on the agenda so Council will have the chance to adjudicate it today.

Robert Pearson, Ward 2 stated he lives next door to the Eastwood school property. He stated on the side of his house at Harvard Ave. and Eastwood Ln. his tree lawn has been blacktopped for close to 50 years. He stated now that the school has been demolished, he's trying to keep his property up. He asked if Council could have the blacktop taken off and grass planted.

Mayor Sellers asked that Service Director Sims go by there tomorrow.

Mr. Pearson stated he does not know Mr. Henderson but he came to their group and showed pictures of how he wanted to do the establishment. It is not going to be some type of hole in the wall; he's trying to build something upscale. He stated Mr. Henderson is trying to have a place that he can walk to with his wife. He stated he thinks people in the neighborhood will enjoy it as well. He commented he doesn't understand why there's so much anger towards him not wanting to build an establishment there. Mr. Pearson stated it could be a turnaround for the plaza because he is trying to go upscale. Any business coming after him would have to be on that certain level as well.

Mayor Sellers replied that he appreciated his commentary. He explained that these matters come before a body of four residents and one councilmember. The applicant comes before the body for approval and the Planning Commission can accept it or reject it. They make a

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recommendation before City Council. He stated the item is on the agenda and Council will decide if the project will go forward.

Mr. Pearson stated he understood but it seems like no one in Ward 2 knew what Mr. Henderson was planning to do. He stated a lot of things have been going on in Ward 2 that many of my neighbors and I know nothing about.

Mayor Sellers responded that Councilwoman Mitchell is the representative of your ward and she is very well aware of the project being proposed. He stated there have been a number of people that showed up in this Chamber to talk about this issue. Mayor Sellers stated he is very well engaged in Ward 2's business deals and properties so it's not in the back.

Mr. Pearson stated ...*<inaudible>*...a few days later they were digging up the ground...*<inaudible>*... something we need to be aware of.

Mayor Sellers responded that right now the city is aware of nothing involving Eastwood school property so he would have to speak to the School Board to find out what's going on.

Announcements from Directors:

Civic & Senior Center – Director Jennifer Lastery wished everyone a good evening. She reminded everyone that the Senior Luncheon is on May 1, 2023 at the Marriott for those over 60 years of age. She explained that they are required to pick up tickets at the Civic & Senior Center. Tickets will be issued tomorrow from 1-3p.m. and Thursday from 9-11a.m. They need to bring a state ID and a current utility bill. She stated the recipients must come and cannot send someone else to pick up their tickets. She is looking forward to see everyone at the luncheon on May 1st!

Finance Department – Director Karen Howse shared there is a 2.9 mil renewal levy coming up for the general operations of the City of Warrensville Heights. She shared that the levy has been in place since 2002 and supports the Police and Fire Departments as well as any assets throughout the city such as parks, recreation, etc. It generates about \$500,000 so they are asking residents to renew it, not support it because it is a renewal, not a new levy.

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Announcements from Council:

Councilman Walter Stewart thanked everyone for coming out and thanked all the residents for their expressing their concerns. He stated he appreciates them coming and speaking out. He asked that everyone have a good evening and please be safe.

Councilwoman Elona C. White shared that Wards 1, 3 and 7 are having their annual Spring Meeting from 7-9p.m.

Councilman Johnny L. Williams Jr. sent out thoughts, hugs and prayers to the family and friends of Garnetta Stallworth who lived on the 3600 block of Country Ln. He stated she recently lost her life in a fire; it is tragic. He thanked Chief Waugh and the Fire Department as well as the North Randall, Highland Hills and Maple Heights firefighters that responded to this unfortunate incident.

Councilman Matthew Howard stated he is here for his fellow Donover Rd. residents and has been since day one. He stated he can get caught in the middle as an elected official of what's right and what's personal. Councilman Howard stated he has to stand with them on this matter even if he didn't live on the street. They are in this together and he drives by their houses every day to make sure nothing funny is going on. He stated if he has to get out and help the ladies, it is exactly what he is going to do. He is not going to stand by and let the dope man or the dope fiends do anything to them on his watch. Councilman Howard stated he can see and feel the hurt that's in their eyes. He stated he's put himself in the position to say "What if that was my mother?" And Ms. Hall is his mother and Ms. Anderson is his sister and they're his neighbors too. Councilman Howard stated he has expressed his concerns to Chief Haynes that sometimes he feels like he has an "X" on his back because he is arguing with the dope man and the fiends about cleaning up his street and that's a problem for him. He stated he had a discussion with Chief Haynes about the vehicle and thanked him for having it towed. He stated it is a blessing to know that at least that's done. He stated hopefully they can get to a place where the property is rectified. He commented that Ms. Anderson has called him at odd hours letting him know things that are going on. If he is in the area and can make it there, he'll come down. He shared that he received a notice that the voting location was at the John Dewey school building. He reported that Highland Hills Mayor and President of Tri-City Dem Club Michael Booker informed him Wards 1, 2 and 3 will be voting at the Civic & Senior Center; Ward 4 will be at the Cuyahoga County Library on Northfield and Wards 5, 6 and 7 will be at John Dewey on Emery Rd.

Law Department

Law Director Teresa Metcalf Beasley had nothing to report.

Council President's Comments

Council President Stanley Anderson stated he heard the remarks of Ms. Wahome as to the many things this country is going through and it is very disturbing. He does not know how they fight it other than when an opportunity presents itself, get out and vote. He stated lots of times it starts on the local

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level and it requires participation. He stated email and call your congressperson and let him/her know how you feel. He commented when you're out in public, look around you and see what's happening.

Community Development –Manager Raymon Turner had a late announcement about the calls the city have gotten from residents about their gas and electric bills. He stated this Thursday, April 20, 2023 from 6-7p.m. NOPEC will be coming out and answering any questions residents have concerning their gas and electric bills. He stated they will discuss the aggregation program and how that might be best for residents. He indicated there were flyers on the lectern.

Mayor's Comments

Mayor Bradley D. Sellers thanked everyone for taking the time to come out. He recognized Ms. Rox and Ms. Strong from Planning Commission; Ms. Tullos, Mr. Hicks and Mr. White from Civil Service Commission; and Ray Freeman for the School Board. He thanked everyone that made a comment and that they have to work through the system. They want to adhere to the rules that are before them and the matter will work itself out. He stated he understood it is uncomfortable but they want them to follow the rules. He commented that he appreciated the passion from the people in different wards. He commented that the councilmembers have done a marvelous job in trying to represent the residents. At times, residents will find out the councilmembers don't always agree with the direction that's recommended to them or they do agree! This is the way matters are adjudicated in this building in an open meeting before these persons here. He stated the people making these recommendations are people that live on the street. Then the seven councilmembers get to decide on the direction their going. People don't always agree with them but they're trying to follow the recommendations of where their heart and the law leads them. He stated the city is pro-business and as long as people are following the rules, everything is everything. When the city needs to enforce the laws on the books, that's what is going to happen.
